



RABBI'S REFLECTIONS On Education: Branches and Roots





Rabbi Michael Rascoe

Many of you have heard that my dad generally did not like overseeing Ivy League graduates, instead preferring those from state schools. When he tried to teach the former what they needed to do, and how to do it, in the real world, they typically said that they had studied

with the world's best professors, and this is the way to do it, while the latter usually just said OK; how do I do it? Years later, I finally asked him why he let me go to Columbia. He answered that he figured he had me long enough that it wouldn't corrupt me. Indeed, this education discussion is not new. An older story illustrates it:

Two famous Harvard graduates, Henry David Thoreau and Ralph Waldo Emerson, once discussed their alma mater. Emerson was impressed with all the courses in all the different branches of learning. Thoreau replied, "Yes, in all the branches, but in none of the roots." While Thoreau criticized Harvard, he did appreciate the library, and the rhetoric classes with Edward Channing. He hated that it taught

"superficial scholarship," and not critical thought.

We still debate critical thinking vs. rote learning, but perhaps Thoreau had another thought in mind. Rote learning teaches one to do a *job*. But is this what education should be? In the western world, for centuries the answer was yes. In the medieval world, one went to university to learn a profession. Greek education, except in Sparta, taught one to be a good citizen. Thoreau probably called for education to be grounded in fundamentals, especially conviction, and for using it for proper purposes. Moreover, he disliked his daily worship, and its' effects on his grades (he hated the whole grading system, even signing a letter demanding it be changed). Yet it's not because he wasn't spiritual; he disliked their spirituality and had his own. Without fostering a spiritual belief, and bettering society, education was vain and at best useless, if not dangerous. Roots provide the support the branches need, without which they cannot exist.

Maybe he echoed Jeremiah 17:5-8 (the haftarah for Behuqqotai). Jeremiah described a bush planted in a desert being easily uprooted, due to shallow roots, while one planted by a stream easily survived whatever nature did to it, due to its deep roots. He compared this to a person: the former is one who trusts in humans, while the latter trusts in God. Faith reveals life's purposes, which serve as our source, and from which we draw inspiration and strength.

I'm not knocking higher education in general, just much of what passes for it these days. Many teachers, especially in the highest echelons, see it as their job to in-

doctrinate students, and say so.

Jewish education always held that it includes a religious component, best expressed as a moral and religious foundation, from which all else flows. As such, there's a tension about how much non-Jewish learning one should study. As my Maimonides philosophy class knows, he held that one must have a thorough grounding in the non-Jewish disciplines, at least in so far as they did not drive one away from God or observance.

A millennium earlier, Rabbi Meir preceded him. He lived about 1900 years ago, when Rome was not overly friendly to Jews. Jews hotly debated how much Greco-Roman thought one could study. Some held that it should all be studied, and others none. The issue which we call assimilation concerned both. Some wanted more, and others less. Rabbi Meir (TB Hagigah. 15b) studied Greek thought as part of his learning from his teacher, Elishah ben Avuyah who later became a heretic (known as *aher*, meaning other), and Rabbi Meir was accused of studying too much Greek thought. He answered with two metaphors: he ate the ripe part of a half-ripe date and discarded the rest, and he ate the edible part of a pomegranate and discarded the rest. He learned what was worthwhile, but not what was dangerous. He learned from others, and still kept his Torah learning and observance. In real education, one learns truth from wherever and whomever, but not at the expense of critical thought, morals, and life's purposes, including bettering society.

Heroic Women in the Hebrew Bible: Miriam, Esther, and Ruth

These three women are among the most heroic characters in the Hebrew Bible. Two of them have books bearing their names, and one has her own cup at the Passover Seder. All three of them teach us about courage, commitment, and hope. I will share highlights of their stories and suggest the contemporary meaning of their experiences.

Rabbi Stephen A. Karol is Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Isaiah in Stony Brook, New York, and the author of Finding Hope and Faith in the Face of Death: Insights of a Rabbi and Mourner. He was ordained at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) in Cincinnati in 1977, and has served at Temple Beth Zion in Buffalo, New York; Congregation Sha'aray Shalom in Hingham, Massachusetts; and Temple Isaiah. He teaches at Temple Isaiah and also at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Stony Brook University. Rabbi Karol lives in Port Jefferson Station, New York, with his wife Donna.




The Mill Road Cheese Shop, Westhampton Beach, (631) 998-0483, now carries some kosher items.


