

RABBI'S REFLECTIONS: Do We Really Pray?





Rabbi Michael Rascoe

One hot, dry summer day, a group of farmers met in their church to pray for rain. After the service, a young girl asked her father, "Do people really expect it to rain?" Her father answered, "Of course, or we wouldn't be here." She asked, "how come nobody has an umbrella?"

Yes, I have done a prayer service for rain. And yes, it did rain a little while later. And no, I don't think we really had anything to do with it. This raises thoughts about prayer, about which, not only have I been teaching a class, I've been sermonizing on it a fair amount recently. It is particularly pertinent because people often look at a traditional service and notice how many words it contains and how quickly we race through it. Indeed, sometimes, we don't even get the words right. So what is prayer?

I addressed this question several times both at the beginning of the class, and in some of the sermons, so I'm only going to repeat a little. Prayer is not about request, what we want from God. In Judaism, this kind of prayer is the least common, and mostly shoved into just the

weekday Amidah. Prayer is about many other things, like, for example, praise and thanks, as I've mentioned. But prayer doesn't exist in a vacuum, either. We have a role; indeed, we have the primary role. Moreover, it exists as the end of a process. Without basic preparations and assumptions, prayer has no meaning.

To quote the great Bard, Shakespeare, in Hamlet, Act 3, Scene 3: "My words fly up; my thoughts remain below; Words without thoughts never to heaven go." (While it would be fun to analyze all the irony and theology behind this statement, and it even is pertinent, you can look it up and reread the play.) King Claudius feels that his prayers remain in him. He points out a remarkable truth about prayer: it requires things within us in order for prayer to be prayer. Prayer requires preparation, setting and kavvanahintention, sincerity, conviction, and trust. Prayer rests on the faith and conviction that it has purpose and value. To shorten Lewis Carroll's dialogue between the March Hare

and Alice through the example provided by the Mad Hatter, "I mean what I say and I say what I mean." (It's also worth reading the story.)

Prayer requires a foundation and knowledge. It requires belief in the words, the setting, and the parties. Prayer requires us to think outside of ourselves and our usual wants, which is also why it requires community. For prayer to work, it requires thought and intention, faith and belief, and an ability to rise above ourselves. Anything less makes prayer mechanical; or worse, hypocritical.

Since this is a tall order to do all the time, it is OK to start without them, and see if you get inspired. At the very least, use it as a time to think about yourself and your values, and if you reflect at all on the words of the traditional liturgy, you in fact will have prayed. Judaism is well aware that prayer is demanding; yet as long as you keep trying, you will achieve it.

Yom Hashoah Program

Temple Israel's Yom Hashoah program this year focused on how the children of survivors have been secondarily affected by the experiences of their parents.

In a very revealing session, our speaker, author A.J. Sidransky, interviewed Shari Gotowner Lopez, the daughter of survivors. She spoke of her parents' fears and overprotective nature. While completely understandable, their protectiveness had an effect which she had to come to grips with in her own life.

While the number of survivors sadly is dwindling each year, the full psychological effects of the Shoah won't be erased, it seems, for many generations, and we must recognize this, and try to heal it.

The Interfaith Bible Class will meet via Zoom, on June 14 and July 12, from 9:30-11:30 AM. Please contact the Rabbi for information and the link.




Where to Purchase Kosher Food Locally

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Temple Israel of Riverhead Celebration of Israel Independence Day on April 27, 2023

On Thursday, April 27, at 6:30 PM, Temple Israel of Riverhead proudly hosted a delegation of wounded Israel Defense Force (IDF) soldiers in honor of Yom HaAtzmaut 75, Israeli Independence Day. Our social hall was decorated with beautiful Israeli-themed balloons and Israeli flags. The snack buffet included Israeli dishes such as bourekas, Moroccan cigars, falafel, hummus, and more. The room was crowded with guests from various communities on the North and the South Forks.

TIR's Vice President Barbara Smith welcomed the guests. Then TIR's Secretary, Linda Prizer introduced Jennifer Hines, a congregant and opera singer, who sang *Yerushalayim Shel Zahav*, and invited us to join in the chorus with her. It was an amazing performance.

Then Linda introduced the Israeli delegation leader, Rabbi Amos Cohen from Hod HaSharon, Israel. He explained that for the last 10 years a nonprofit, self-funded organization, Together For Them, has been traveling to the United States and visiting synagogues and schools around the country to tell the true story of life in Israel from the hearts of wounded IDF soldiers. Three wounded soldiers shared their unbelievable personal stories, which moved and touched everyone in the room. They concluded that no matter how injured they were, they still volunteered to continue serving IDF because of their love for their families and friends, and their responsibility to the Jewish people in the diaspora to always have a homeland to come to). They expressed that Eretz Yisroel belongs to and is a home to all Jews everywhere, and that no matter how different the political views are, we are all united and solid together.

This memorable evening and celebration moved everyone in the room, sometimes to tears and sometimes to much laughter. These 4 men were one of us, and with us. They easily mingled and chatted with all guests afterward. We were also joined by Lirin Shay Goshen, Director of the Randie Waldbaum Malinsky Center for Israel, and Senior Shlicha (emissary) of the Sochnut Jewish Agency for Israel. She added her own interesting perspective to the conversation. Much wonderful feedback has been received. Many found it amazing, informative, and just emotional and uplifting. The evening ended with guests carrying the handheld Israeli flags that had adorned the tables. What a strong statement and a beautiful scene to see!



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
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Ongoing Silent Fundraisers for Temple Israel

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

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
