



(This column originated in a sermon first delivered decades ago.)

Purim is part of an eternal battle between Amaleq, a descendant of Esau, and the People of Israel, particularly the tribe of Benjamin. Amaleq represents multigenerational behavior, a

group of people who refuse to follow morals everyone else follows. Haman is a descendant of Amaleq, Mordecai of Benjamin; the battle continues. The Rabbis note that Benjamin never bowed to Esau, like everyone else in his family, because he wasn't alive. As we know from the Haggadah and history, Jews seem to attract some people who are demonic. Further, throughout history, some Jews refuse to believe that these people direct this hatred toward all Jews, not just the pious or religious. Finally, we learn from Purim that God no longer intervenes directly in human affairs, like in the Exodus, but through human beings. This last point is based on the twofold idea that God is never mentioned in the Book of Esther; and Mordecai notes that if Esther doesn't do her part, salvation will come from elsewhere.

One notices that Mordecai provokes a confrontation with Haman by refusing to bow. Haman's office should have been enough for Mordecai to show respect and accordingly bow. So the Rabbis claim that Haman wore an idol, which is why Mordecai refused to bow, because, while one can bow to a person holding an office worthy of respect, one cannot bow to an idol.

Does Mordecai have the right to decide a policy question of this magnitude with such potential consequences? For the Rabbis, Mordecai was one of the great Torah leaders of his generation. Some claim that he went back to Israel when Cyrus, King of Persia, allowed the Jews to return and to rebuild the Temple. When he heard that Haman rose to power, he returned to Persia because he knew Haman's measure and values, since he knew him when he lived in Persia. Haman's rise would not bode well for all Jews. Moreover, the Rabbis also noted, based on a careful reading of the story, that while most of the people and leaders accepted Mordecai's analysis and actions, not everyone did.

In the end, Mordecai was right. The story raises some issues: may a Jewish leader make policy decisions that affect everyone?; should we protest, and even pursue confrontation, if deemed necessary?

My colleague, Rabbi Joseph Radinsky, obm, commented that Rabbi Soloveitchik, obm, did not believe in the concept of da'at Torah: the idea that one consults a rabbi in all things, even matters of public policy, due to the level of Torah learning. We read about this more frequently in Israel when certain rabbis make political pronouncements which others feel obligated to follow. Rabbi Soloveitchik opposed the idea that Torah learning should be used to make policy decisions, and he derived the idea from analyzing the Book of Esther, particularly that not everyone agreed with Mordecai's confrontation and his subsequent handling of events. Accordingly, when it came to policy decisions, Rabbi Soloveitchik told his students that they should make up their own minds and not consult more learned rabbis.

Some of us remember that in the days of the struggle of Jews living in the Soviet Union, we heavily debated how best to help them. Some advocated for confrontation, others for behind-the-scenes diplomacy. Most of the Jewish establishment favored the latter. A few leaders did not. such as Rabbi Heschel and Elie Wiesel. Students favored confrontation. Even among those who favored confrontation, they argued about where to draw the line. Some even threw paint on artists and other cultural figures. It turned out that the Soviet authorities paid attention to the confrontation, and it helped determine their reactions, and eventually led to their release.

From this we learn not to rely on great Torah scholars to decide. We must make our own decisions. But we should not bury our heads in the sand. We must realize that when it comes to real evil by people who show no use for common morality, we must confront it. If we hope that the messiah, or the messianic age, will come, then we must deal with situations correctly. May it happen soon and in our day.



Dear Temple Family and Friends:

This will mark the fourth year that we will be participating in the Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program, after a 3 year COVID break. We hope that you will join with the other members of Temple Israel of Riverhead and your family on Sunday May 5th, erev Yom HaShoah, and light this candle. We light the candle in our homes in memory of the victims of the Holocaust.

The act of kindling this flame, and reading the enclosed meditation, can be a moving ritual to remind us of what happened to our people not so long ago. Placing the candle in your window is a way to help remind the community. This moment can also be an appropriate opportunity to discuss the Holocaust with your children.

The **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program** is a project of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs, in cooperation with the Men of Reform Judaism and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism.

It is our hope that the observance of Yom HaShoah, centered on the lighting of a Yellow Candle, will become an annual event in your home and in the homes of every member of our congregation. Many congregations have already made this commemoration an important day in their Jewish calendar.

We ask that you help underwrite the cost of this project. Funds received over and above our program cost will go directly to support future educational programs in our synagogue, helping to insure the future of our people. We ask that you consider gifts in multiples of \$18. The number 18 is *chai*, Life.

By remembering, by doing our part to insure our future, we celebrate the ongoing life of our people, even as we memorialize those destroyed in the Shoah. We welcome and appreciate your support of our efforts in this commemoration and our on-going education programs.

The Yellow Candle™ Program - A History

Over seventy years ago, half of the earth's Jewish population perished at the hands of another Amalek, an Austrian house painter who seized control of Europe and threw the earth into darkness. God's light unto the other nations flickered but did not die. A new, modern Exodus arose from the depths of despair and tragedy. From the ashes of Europe, survivors of the Holocaust, or Shoah, made their way towards new lives. Emigrants dispersed around the world, to the new State of Israel, and to the western hemisphere. In these places, they began to rebuild shattered lives. In the following decades, survivors asked another question: How could Yahrzeits be observed for those victims whose entire families had been wiped out? An idea was born, a special memorial candle with yellow wax, in remembrance of the yellow stars forced upon European Jews in the 1930s.



The Yellow CandleTM was created in 1981 by FJMC clubs in Canada, New England, and elsewhere to keep alive the memory of the Six Million who perished in the Shoah. The Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish memorial Yahrzeit candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning and on the Yahrzeit anniversary of a family member. The candle's yellow wax serves to remind us of the yellow arm band which Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime. A photo on the candle container shows young people visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. This reflects the importance of teaching our youth the lessons of the Holocaust and of remembering the Six Million. In addition, the program logo is a yellow Magen David (Star of David) outlined with barbed wire, with the word "Jude" in the middle. This preserves the memory of the armband or cloth patch that Jews were forced to wear in the ghettos of Eastern Europe.

For Jewish people, remembering a victim is a great mitzvah.




The Mill Road Cheese Shop, Westhampton Beach, (631) 998-0483, now carries some kosher items.




