

RABBI'S REFLECTIONS 5 Years, so it's WZC elections again

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Rabbi Michael Rascoe sons to vote.)

Five years ago, I wrote about Purim, homelessness, and elections. It's World Zionist Congress (WZC) election time again. Your vote is even more important for Israel and what you want Israel to be. (If you just want voting information, go to the end and skip the history and rea-

Over 125 years ago, Theodor Herzl founded the World Zionist Congress. Jews worldwide vote for its delegates every 5 years. Delegates authorize spending over \$1 billion annually for many purposes, both within Israel and in the diaspora, including Jewish identity and communities, education, and antisemitism. It fosters short- and long-term change, and influences and helps set the agenda for a variety of other organizations, including the Jewish National Fund (JNF), United Israel Appeal, and the Jewish Agency (JA). Almost a third of its 525 delegates come from the United States, and we vote for them through the American Zionist Movement (AZM). A similar number come from Israel, but Israelis don't vote. Their delegates are apportioned from the Knesset, Israel's

parliament, based on election results. The rest are split among the other countries of the world.

The last election included some major surprises, which threaten to change the way the Jewish world operates. In the last election, a new party called Eretz Hakodesh ran, and emerged with a surprising number of seats, enough to make it the third largest USA party behind ARZA, the Reform Movement's Zionist arm, an Orthodox/Mizrahi party; and kicking MERCAZ, the Conservative Movement's Zionist arm, to fourth place. Until recently, most of the right-wing Orthodox and Hareidi parties sat out these elections because they did not believe in Zionism, signing a pledge that they did believe in it, and that they upheld the platforms on which it stood. They realized that the WZC controlled much money and had much influence, so they decided to become active. Eretz Hakodesh hopes to make an even larger push this year, from 25,000 votes to 100,000 votes. Some of the things for which they've taken credit:

- -arranging and expanding Israel military exemptions for its adherents;
- -influencing JA's decisions, e.g. block egalitarian prayer at the kotel (Western Wall), and reform (make more Orthodox) Israel's kashrut system;
- -bringing tens of thousands of yeshivah students to Israel just during COVID when it was illegal, and these students did spread COVID in Israel;
- -having Nefesh B'Nefesh, which facilitates aliyah (immigration), to Israel, create a special desk just for Hareidim;
- -getting JNF, which owns most of the land in Israel, to expand West Bank / Judea and Samaria settlements.

It was all on their website, until they were challenged about how some of their claims opposed the platform to which they agreed in order to join the WZC. For example: military service is a key ele-Zionist ideology ment of the "encouraging recruitment and service in the Israel Defense Forces and the security forces and strengthening them as the protective force of the Jewish people living in Zion, as well as encouraging full National Service for anyone exempted in law from service in the IDF". Their response was, "The scope of activity and target audience of the Eretz Hakodesh movement are exclusively Jews from the Diaspora and foreign students. It is possible that a linguistic misinterpretation, or differences in translation, created a misleading impression." They've claimed that many of their constituents are dual citizens of Israel and the USA.

They hope in the next WZC to redirect tens of millions of dollars to protect Torah values in Eretz Hakodesh, (a word play based on both their name and a traditional phrase meaning the Holy Land of Israel). They have ties to United Torah Judaism, which does not identify with Zionism, and yeshivah student exemptions is one of their main issues.

There will be 9 new parties this year seeking votes, and over half represent ultra-Orthodox Judaism. They all hope to overcome, as Eretz Hakodesh phrases it, the "woke left-wing factions...using this platform and resources to push an agenda that undermines Torah values and weakens the frum community" (i.e. observant community).

Women moving towards freedom and independence through the bicycle and motorcycle

Sunday, March 16, 3:00 p.m.

"The greatest development to bring women closer towards emancipation was the invention of the bicycle."

Certain adventurous women chose a different path to freedom and independence by riding bicycles and motorcycles. Riding these machines challenged social mores, and led to a change in how society viewed women. It also changed the way women viewed themselves. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, "The New Woman" started riding these "freedom machines", and could for the first time venture out without a male chaperone. Now women could exercise in fresh air in public. These new activities necessitated a change in women's dress. Long Victorian dresses, corsets, and bustles were replaced by form-fitting exercise outfits. Lady motorcyclists wore leather pants and jackets. The bicycle became a symbol of the struggle for the vote.

Congregant and historian Bruce Kagan will take you on "the road less traveled", highlighting the biographies of certain women bicycle and motorcycle riders, and how their journey elevated society.

Dear Temple Family and Friends:

This will mark the fifth year that we will be participating in the Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program. We hope that you will join with the other members of Temple Israel of Riverhead and your family on Wednesday, April 23, 2025, erev Yom HaShoah, and light this candle. We light the candle in our homes in memory of the victims of the Holocaust.

The act of kindling this flame, and reading the enclosed meditation, can be a moving ritual to remind us of what happened to our people not so long ago. Placing the candle in your window is a way to help remind the community, and this moment can also be an appropriate opportunity to discuss the Holocaust with your children.

The **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program** is a project of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs, in cooperation with the Men of Reform Judaism and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism.

It is our hope that the observance of Yom HaShoah, centered on the lighting of a Yellow Candle, will become an annual event in your home and in the home of every member of our congregation. Many congregations have already made this commemoration an important day in their Jewish calendar.

We ask that you help to underwrite the cost of this project. Funds received over and above our program cost will go directly to support future educational programs in our synagogue, which can help to insure the future of our people. We would ask that you consider gifts in multiples of \$18. The number 18 is *chai*, life.

By remembering, by doing our part to insure our future, we celebrate the ongoing life of our people, even as we memorialize those who were destroyed in the Shoah. We welcome and appreciate your support of our efforts in this Shoah commemoration and our on-going education programs.

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The Yellow Candle™ Program - A History

Over seventy years ago, half of the earth's Jewish population perished at the hands of another Amalek, an Austrian house painter who seized control of Europe and threw the earth into darkness. God's light unto the other nations flickered but did not die. A new, modern Exodus arose from the depths of despair and tragedy. From the ashes of Europe, survivors of the Holocaust, or Shoah, made their way towards new lives. Emigrants dispersed around the world, to the new State of Israel, and to the western hemisphere. In these places, they began to rebuild shattered lives. In the following decades, survivors asked another question: How could Yahrzeits be observed for those victims whose entire families had been wiped out? An idea was born, a special memorial candle with yellow wax, in remembrance of the yellow stars forced upon European Jews in the 1930s.



The Yellow CandleTM was created in 1981 by FJMC clubs in Canada, New England, and elsewhere to keep alive the memory of the Six Million who perished in the Shoah. The Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish memorial Yahrzeit candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning and on the Yahrzeit anniversary of a family member. The candle's yellow wax serves to remind us of the yellow arm band which Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime. A photo on the candle container shows young people visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. This reflects the importance of teaching our youth the lessons of the Holocaust and of remembering the Six Million. In addition, the program logo is a yellow Magen David (Star of David) outlined with barbed wire, with the word "Jude" in the middle. This preserves the memory of the armband or cloth patch that Jews were forced to wear in the ghettos of Eastern Europe.

For Jewish people, remembering a victim is a great mitzvah.

Yom Hashoah Program: Songs and Stories of Elie Wiesel Cantor Deborah Katchko-Gray



Sharing a rare recording of a sing-along with Elie Wiesel, Cantor Deborah Katchko-Gray imparts lessons and wisdom from studying with him beginning in 1976 at Boston University. Hearing his voice will remind us of his prophetic teachings and his passion for faith, memory, and study.

Deborah Katchko-Gray is a fourth-generation cantor. She founded the Women Cantors' Network (1982). Since 1999 she has served Congregation Shir Shalom in Ridgefield, CT. She has been honored four times during her 25 years at her temple. Her ten recordings include *Passover Seder Songs, Kindersongs, and Hanukkah Songs of Light and Hope*. The American Jewish Archives collects her papers and history. Her recording and songbook, *Katchko: Three Generations of Cantorial Art*, is unique with guitar chords in a female-friendly key. Her book, Prayerful Creations (2019), is about Jewish Swedish Weaving of tallitot. Deborah's story is in *The Invisible Thread - A Portrait of American Jewish Women*. She is the first recipient of the Debbie Friedman Miriam Award (April 2020).

Her new project, Sacred Sounds Reborn, with Beth Styles, was reviewed recently by Cantor Jack Mendelson..."I just listened to two songs from your new musical project: "Sacred Sounds Reborn," and I am very impressed. The idea of starting each Kabalat Shabbat psalm in the Katchko nusach, and then going forth in a more modern approach based on the nusach, is brilliant! Your renditions of the Katchko nusach have the flair of an experienced Hazzan expertly singing in the idiom. Most impressive is the beauty and sweetness of your voice."







BJ's and Costco also have pareve cookies in their bakeries.



To vote, you need to be Jewish, at least 18 years old, and a USA citizen or a permanent USA resident who primarily lives in the USA. You pay the AZM a \$5 registration and processing fee. Visit zionistelection.org or azm.org/elections/ to learn more, register, and vote. I encourage you to vote for MERCAZ, the Conservative Movement's Zionist organization, or even ARZA, the Reform Movement's Zionist Organization, to temper the ultra-Orthodox. Other groups traded votes for their issues and so voted with the ultra-Orthodox on their issues.

Alas, this is not Purim Torah. I encourage you to vote, not just for you, but for your descendants, to feel welcome in Israel in the future.
