

RABBI'S REFLECTIONS: We are Torah

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I partly stole the title and sermon from my friend and senior colleague Rabbi Joseph Radinsky, z''l, obm, who wrote a sermon entitled, "We are the Torah." My issue is the title. I will deal with this after the remarks.

He notes that since we give Torah such importance, we'd

expect great pageantry on Shavu'ot. Yet traditional services don't have much. We don't because Torah itself must be what's important. We highly venerate it. People rush into burning buildings to save one. In this, we turn the Torah into an idol, to borrow a phrase from the Israeli iconoclast Yeshayahu Leibowitz, z"l. While Torah stands at Judaism's center, it is not Judaism.

Rava (*Makkot* 22b) says, "How foolish are some who stand [out of respect] before a Torah scroll, but do not stand before a great scholar."* Accordingly one shouldn't idolize a Torah scroll; one should respect the person who teaches it because that person embodies the Torah's teachings, in daily life and behavior. While it's true that in the degree of holiness of synagogue objects the Torah scroll is highest, and one can't just use it for anything

else, one can sell it in order to redeem a captive, marry off a bride, or support a Torah student's learning (based on *Megillah* 27a, see *Shulhan Arukh Orah Hayyim* 153:6, cf 10 for a private Torah).

Rabbi Radinsky also mentions that Mosheh broke the Two Tablets of the Ten Sayings because they weren't intrinsically holy.\(^\) Their holiness was "only to the degree that they could change the people so that they would want to live good and decent lives. The purpose for studying the *Torah* is to make us want to do what we should do, to become the carriers of our faith". Shavu'ot doesn't have many symbols to stress this reason. "The *Torah* should transform us so that we become the living example of its teachings."

My issue is the word "the". "The Torah" turns Torah into an idol. In today's Jewish world, "The Torah" refers to either the scroll, or Rabbinic tradition, often to the detriment of studying Torah itself because the only thing that matters is its Rabbinic interpretations; and if Rabbis disagree, they must be harmonized or ignored out of existence. There is no one interpretation of Torah, and this idea, as well as the scroll's veneration. turns The Torah into an idol. When it's idol worship, we lose sight of its effect on people. We justify, only "The Tradition" as paramount. In turn, only the most restrictive interpretation is the best, and one excuses all behaviors that further this point. This allows the right to treat everyone to their left as sinners who must be put in their place, not only because they aren't right and true, but because they are a danger to those who are. This is idolatry.

Non-right "folk" who treat a Torah scroll more respectfully than other people aren't different from the right, even as they decry the right. This is idolatry.

The left too is guilty of idolatry. Torah only is

how we treat other people. We must call out those who don't hold the same values, for they've lost sight of Torah's point. The left is no different from those they castigate, and maybe worse. They treat opponents poorly because they treat other people poorly, which really holds that the ends justify the means. Worse, the more removed from Torah they get, the more they lose sight of it and its beauty, as well as the insights that it still has to teach us. The traditionalist guips that nontraditionalists cannot be apikorsim, heretics, because they don't know enough to be heretics. In Judaism, a heretic must be knowledgeable of Torah in order to violate it as a heretic. As they point out, the left which castigates them are ignoramuses when it comes to Torah. The left too loses sight of Torah leading to behavior by internalizing its teachings.

Everyone really claims that there is one Torah, and only I, and everyone like me, has "The Torah". Torah has many interpretations and paths, so no one person can have "The Torah". Only God has it; hence, they are all idolaters as they substitute their opinions for God's. We don't, and can't, know what God wants. To claim that we do makes us God; hence it is idolatry. With no one Torah, there is no "The Torah". Torah allows for a wide latitude. Only when we study it, internalize it, and act it out, will we be Torah.

Hag same-ah, a joyous and happy Shavu'ot.

- * Regarding this statement, the usual translation of "some" is "rest" and "great scholar" is "great person". In the context of the *g'mara*, it is in the midst of a discussion of how the rabbis can correctly understand the Torah differently than the literal meaning, specifically on how they interpret 40 lashes to be a maximum of 39.




Where to Purchase Kosher Food Locally

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

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
