

Rabbi Michael Rascoe

This title is a doubleentendre (neither is risqué, but both are risky.) Thanksgiving we often call Turkey Day, as we consume this quintessential American bird. Ben Franklin wanted it to be the national bird for its moral character (today's stupid, flightless bird is bred to be that way,) and because it

protects its territory (against British redcoats.) Turkey also is a Muslim nation established by Mustafa Kemal Pasha (a Battle of Gallipoli hero) in 1923 (thus the title Atatürk, "father of the Turks.") He was its first president, began modern legal, social, and political reforms, and separated mosque and state; most of which current President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan seems to want to undo. This led me to think about Jews in the US, religion, and the Judeo-Christian ethic and heritage.

Louis Ginzberg's "Prayer for Our Country" (in Conservative prayer books) reads, "Creator of all flesh, bless all the inhabitants of our country with Your spirit. May citizens of all races and creeds forge a

common bond in true harmony to banish hatred and bigotry, and to safeguard the ideals and free institutions that are the pride and glory of our country. May this land, under Your providence, be an influence for good throughout the world, uniting all people in peace and freedom." Dr. Ginzberg possibly echoed President George Washington's sentiments from a letter to the Newport, Rhode Island Jews (August 21, 1790,) citing the US as an example to the world of an "enlarged and liberal policy...for happily the Government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only that they who live under its protection, should demean themselves as good citizens." He ends by saying that each of us "shall sit in safety under his own Vine and Figtree, and there shall be none to make him afraid," (quoting Micah 4:4,) and that "the Father of all mercies scatter light and not darkness in our paths, and make us all...useful here, and in His own due time and way everlastingly happy." President Washington partly quoted the earlier letter (August 17, 1790) by Moses Seixas, the Newport synagogue warden, inviting him to Newport.

This history reminds us of some truths. Some we love, and some may make us uncomfortable. Yet we are thankful for them. First, they concretize our equal place and rights in the US, including the right to worship as we wish. Besides freedom, it assumes we must work with other people and faiths to better our country, and to make it a beacon to the world. Given our long history, we should be eternally grateful for these rights.

Some are uncomfortable with the clear association to God, and our joyful gratitude

towards and humble dependence upon God.* The history of the holiday asserts this truth from the Pilgrims through Presidents George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and Franklin Delano Roosevelt, up to modern Presidents like Reagan, Carter, Bush, Clinton, Bush, Obama, and presumably Trump. Present from our earliest days is the belief that God endowed us with certain inalienable rights, which are tied to our destiny as individuals and as a country. Reverend Martin Luther King spoke of it as the basis for understanding the essential human worth of each one of us. Commentator Walter Lippman called it "the forgotten foundation of democracy," and wrote that we will suffer as we move from these principles: "The decay of decency in the modern age, the rebellion against law and good faith, the treatment of human beings as things, as mere instruments of power and ambition, is without a doubt the consequence of the decay of the belief in man as something more than an animal animated by highlyconditioned reflexes and chemical reactions." Liberal commentator Charles Reese made a similar observation.

Many will gather at the Thanksgiving table and either thank God or notice something missing. I have criticized "the Judeo -Christian ethic" (in which the Bible ends Judaism, everything else is Christian; nor do we always agree with their ethics,) but we both imitate God; care for orphans, widows: befriend strangers, and strangers; and feed and clothe them because we were strangers in the land of Egypt" (Deuteronomy 10:12-19.) must rediscover our religious, God-based values. If we do so, in the spirit of



*I have noticed that many people walk around, fold tallitot, and head out while we sing 'America the Beautiful' and 'Hatikvah.' If those songs have any meaning, then we should stand at attention. If they don't, we should stop singing them, and end the service 90 seconds earlier.

Many have heard me comment that we should pay attention to the words in the book, which are the correct words. Grant-

ed, some of the words we often hear for 'America' make more sense, but they are not what's written. As for 'Hatikvah,' some of us remember 3 versions ago. Imber's poem from 1877-8 (not published until 1878) changed quite a bit in 1905, and a bit more in 1933, when the 18th Zionist Congress adopted it as its anthem. The words changed again slightly to reflect statehood between 1948 and the early 1950's. They were again altered a bit over time up until about 1968. Interestingly, even though it was the unofficial national anthem after statehood, performed by the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra immediately after Ben Gurion declared statehood, it was not officially declared the national anthem until November 2004.

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Rabbi Rascoe to Discuss Buber's I and Thou

Rabbi Rascoe will be discussing Martin Buber's book, *I and Thou*. The first session will be held on Tuesday, November 14, at 7 PM at Temple Israel, with more to follow.

Buber's *I and Thou* is a widely-read, influential, and frequently misunderstood book which religious people tend to love and academics often don't. We will look at the book and try to understand the I-You relationship vis-a-vis the I-It relationship. You need not read the book on your own, since we will read and explore it during the class.

There are two translations. The older and classic one is by Ronald Gregor Smith. Buber authorized it and felt it was the best translation. A friend, colleague, and critic, and possibly the first to teach Buber in a college class, Walter Kaufmann translated it again after Buber's death at the request of Buber's family. These translations are very different, but if you already own one, bring it regardless. It might even be interesting to compare them. If you don't own one, Rabbi Rascoe recommends the Kaufmann translation, although he hasn't personally read it. Both versions are available online at Amazon.

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
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
