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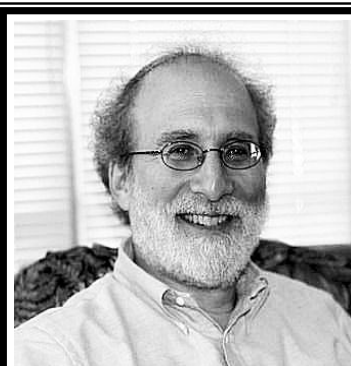
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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS:

Tension and Resolution at the Seder on Pesah

The Pesah seder is full of tensions, even in practice. For example, most of us think we need 3 matsot at the seder, but some only use 2. We have different kinds and styles of Jews present in the seder, including 4 children. Memory/history vs. present. Slavery vs. freedom. Matsah of affliction/poverty vs. redemption. How much matsah to eat, how many cups of wine, 4 or 5, etc. We have haroset (the apple, nut, wine mixture) when the Talmud rules that it is not required. Why do we invite people in for the bread of affliction/poverty but don't mention the Pesah/Passover offering at all?

How many matsot do we need, and how much must we minimally eat? How we view them includes how we resolve them. Most of us know the midrash that 3 matsot stand for 3 kinds of Jews: Kohen, Levi, and Yisrael, but there are legal reasons. We break 1, so do we need 2 complete ones to bless motsi like every holiday (based on the double portion of manna that fell in the wilderness on Friday), and 1 for the blessing mat-

zah? That makes 3 matsot, or is 2 enough; and since we started with 2, it's ok to have only 1 ½ for motsi. Ashkenazim use 3, and Sepharadim 2.

Ashkenazim eat a minimum amount of 2 olives' size worth of matzah: 1 for motsi, and 1 for blessing matsah, also due to manna. Sepharadim (and Rav Moshe Feinstein followers) say 1 olive's worth is enough, as we don't worry about the double portion of manna on Pesah.

Maybe the people who require 3 matsot say that the only way to get out of the broken human condition (i.e. ½ matsah/slavery) that Pesah symbolizes is to have a vision of wholeness, the future. This may explain why people who have lived here for a while easily break when things are rough, but immigrants who came with nothing often make do to ensure that, if not they, at least their children, will do better. If we have a vision of the future, we have a purpose to survive; so we find a way to survive, or at least for our children to thrive.

Rabbi Soloveitchik says that exile and slavery teach compassion. If we don't learn compassion, then the operative mode is to make the next generation suffer as we did, e.g. fraternity hazings, upper-class students look down on new students, bosses mistreat underlings. We keep haroset on the table to dip the bitter herbs in something sweet to show how we get over life's bitterness, and the whole matsah to let us see past the broken matsah of life. The bitter leads to the sweet, and we overcome life's difficulties with a future vision.

In order to overcome this, the seder requires two other things: present and dialogue. The seder commemorates a past event, but it will remain only history unless we follow the haggadah and require ourselves person-

ally to feel redeemed from slavery. History and memory are not enough to keep us or Judaism going. Seeing ourselves as personally involved in it is preferable.

Each generation has its own problems, music, clothes, words, etc. The young know that the old don't get it and made the world worse. The seder brings us together for dialogue. We disagree, we misunderstand, maybe even distrust each other, but the seder tells us to communicate. When the seder becomes just a meal, we lose both making the history present, and this approach to life. We further the old-young gap. Yet the old still have an idea of what Judaism means, unlike the young. We don't just eat; we discuss the real issues that the seder raises. Maybe we will find that the young and old don't disagree as much as we think about what we want the world to be, and so might learn that the difference is more in how to get there. Maybe we will find that Judaism provides the long-term goals that started humanity on this path, and that the seder stands at the heart of this whole enterprise that for one to be free, we must all be free, and have obligations to make things better.

The story is told of a USA soldier who returned home from a prisoner of war camp. A reporter asked him about his thoughts during imprisonment. The soldier replied, "I spent much time wondering whether I would be worthy of freedom when I received it." By re-enacting the seder and reliving the past in such a way as to feel part of it, we give meaning to the present, and only by vision and dialogue will we continue it and find meaning in it.

Hag kasher v'same-ah, have a happy and kasher holiday.

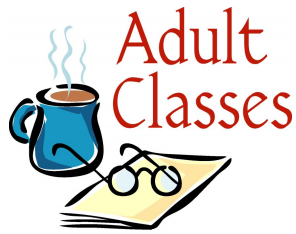

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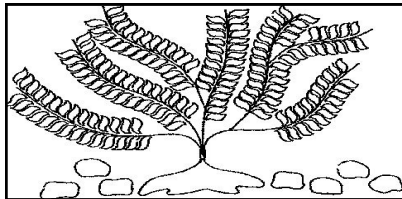
