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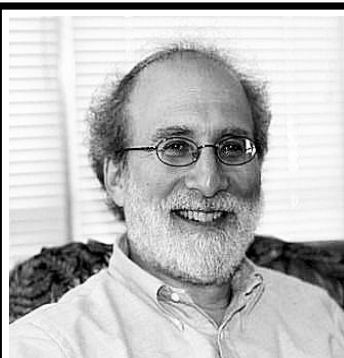
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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

Pharaoh and Moses: Contrasting Personalities

The Sages say that Pharaoh's greatest sin was that he had an inflated sense of self-importance. He thought of himself as a god, "Ani v'afsi od—there is none as exalted as I...the Nile is my own. I made it myself." This, the Sages say, is why the first plague was to turn the Nile into blood, to teach Pharaoh a lesson about pride. Note the evolution of Egyptian art over time, from the earliest leaders needing the people's help, to the later leaders doing everything by themselves, with the people reduced to no more than at most hands.

A medieval story tells of a famous king who admired great leaders. He heard of Moses and sent someone to paint his portrait. Because he could look at a picture and determine character, he wanted to see what made Mosheh great, without traveling a distance. The painter returned. The king looked at his picture and observed that it couldn't be accurate, as the picture showed a man full of pride. The artist insisted on its accuracy. Eventually the king went to meet Moses to see for himself. To his surprise, the picture was a remarkable likeness. The astonished king met with

Mosheh and asked him about it. Moses replied that, indeed, he was prideful, but he worked very hard to overcome it, because a great leader must be humble. Of him the Bible says, “The man Moses was very humble, above all the people who are on the face of the earth” (Numbers 12:3).

Some time ago, a television personality fired a singing member with the reason being, “He lost his humility.” The singer quickly gained prominence and financial success. Presumably, he did not learn his lesson.

Jewish tradition is not against pride. A certain amount is necessary. Even Hasidim, who greatly value humility, say, “When the Evil Urge whispers in your ear, ‘You are unworthy to fulfill Torah,’ you must say, ‘I am worthy.’” A Jew, once upon a time, when considering doing something unseemly, used to think, “Es past nit far a Yid; this conduct does not become a Jew.” Zusha of Hanipol, or Simhah Bunim of Psishkha, used to carry a slip of paper in each front pocket. Written on one was “For my sake the world was created,” and

on the other was, “Even the gnat was created before me,” (based on a midrash, or “I am but dust and ashes,” based on Genesis 18:27). The trick was to know when to pull out the correct paper.

In Gilbert and Sullivan’s Mikado, we have the warning, “You have no idea how poor an opinion I have of myself, and how little I deserve it.” The Kotsker Rebbe observed that the mitsvah of humility is the only one which does not require intent, for as soon as one becomes conscious of one’s humility, one loses it. Micah 6:8 sums up a person’s highest duties: “To do justice, to love mercy, and walk humbly with your God.”

What we need to do is to keep some form of perspective, as these sayings suggest. Despite Genesis and the U.S. Declaration of Independence, few people follow through on the idea that all people are created equal. Even more true is George Orwell’s 1984: All people are equal; only some people are more equal than others. A sense of God should remind us that we are not the arbiters of everything. As we

This will mark the fifth year that we will be participating in the Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program. We hope that you will join with the other members of Temple Israel of Riverhead and your family on Wednesday, April 23, 2025, erev Yom HaShoah, and light this candle. We light the candle in our homes in memory of the victims of the Holocaust.

The act of kindling this flame, and reading the enclosed meditation, can be a moving ritual to remind us of what happened to our people not so long ago. Placing the candle in your window is a way to help remind the community, and this moment can also be an appropriate opportunity to discuss the Holocaust with your children.

The **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program** is a project of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs, in cooperation with the Men of Reform Judaism and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism.

It is our hope that the observance of Yom HaShoah, centered on the lighting of a Yellow Candle, will become an annual event in your home and in the home of every member of our congregation. Many congregations have already made this commemoration an important day in their Jewish calendar.

We ask that you help to underwrite the cost of this project. Funds received over and above our program cost will go directly to support future educational programs in our synagogue, which can help to insure the future of our people. We would ask that you consider gifts in multiples of \$18. The number 18 is *chai*, life.

By remembering, by doing our part to insure our future, we celebrate the ongoing life of our people, even as we memorialize those who were destroyed in the Shoah. We welcome and appreciate your support of our efforts in this Shoah commemoration and our on-going education programs.

The Yellow Candle™ Program - A History

Over seventy years ago, half of the earth's Jewish population perished at the hands of another Amalek, an Austrian house painter who seized control of Europe and threw the earth into darkness. God's light unto the other nations flickered but did not die. A new, modern Exodus arose from the depths of despair and tragedy. From the ashes of Europe, survivors of the Holocaust, or Shoah, made their way towards new lives. Emigrants dispersed around the world, to the new State of Israel, and to the western hemisphere. In these places, they began to rebuild shattered lives. In the following decades, survivors asked another question: How could Yahrzeits be observed for those victims whose entire families had been wiped out? An idea was born, a special memorial candle with yellow wax, in remembrance of the yellow stars forced upon European Jews in the 1930s.



The Yellow Candle™ was created in 1981 by FJMC clubs in Canada, New England, and elsewhere to keep alive the memory of the Six Million who perished in the Shoah. The Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish memorial Yahrzeit candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning and on the Yahrzeit anniversary of a family member. The candle's yellow wax serves to remind us of the yellow arm band which Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime. A photo on the candle container shows young people visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. This reflects the importance of teaching our youth the lessons of the Holocaust and of remembering the Six Million. In addition, the program logo is a yellow Magen David (Star of David) outlined with barbed wire, with the word "Jude" in the middle. This preserves the memory of the armband or cloth patch that Jews were forced to wear in the ghettos of Eastern Europe.

For Jewish people, remembering a victim is a great mitzvah.

Yom Hashoah Program: Songs and Stories of Elie Wiesel Cantor Deborah Katchko-Gray



Sharing a rare recording of a sing-along with Elie Wiesel, Cantor Deborah Katchko-Gray imparts lessons and wisdom from studying with him beginning in 1976 at Boston University. Hearing his voice will remind us of his prophetic teachings and his passion for faith, memory, and study.

Deborah Katchko-Gray is a fourth-generation cantor. She founded the Women Cantors' Network (1982). Since 1999 she has served Congregation Shir Shalom in Ridgefield, CT. She has been honored four times during her 25 years at her temple. Her ten recordings include *Passover Seder Songs*, *Kindersongs*, and *Hanukkah Songs of Light and Hope*. The American Jewish Archives collects her papers and history. Her recording and songbook, *Katchko: Three Generations of Cantorial Art*, is unique with guitar chords in a female-friendly key. Her book, *Prayerful Creations* (2019), is about Jewish Swedish Weaving of tallitot. Deborah's story is in *The Invisible Thread - A Portrait of American Jewish Women*. She is the first recipient of the Debbie Friedman Miriam Award (April 2020).

Her new project, *Sacred Sounds Reborn*, with Beth Styles, was reviewed recently by Cantor Jack Mendelson... "I just listened to two songs from your new musical project: "Sacred Sounds Reborn," and I am very impressed. The idea of starting each Kabbalat Shabbat psalm in the Katchko nusach, and then going forth in a more modern approach based on the nusach, is brilliant! Your renditions of the Katchko nusach have the flair of an experienced Hazzan expertly singing in the idiom. Most impressive is the beauty and sweetness of your voice."

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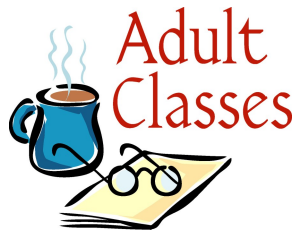

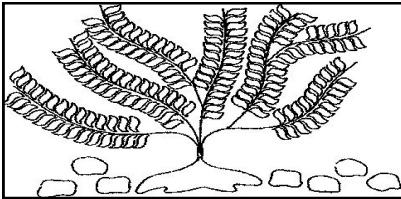
