

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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS On Weddings and Shavu'ot¹

Since many rabbis don't consider counting the Omer as being a Biblical requirement, they wonder why celebrate Shavu'ot? We are Rabbinic Jews. The Rabbis say Shavu'ot occurs on the 6th of Sivan,^{2,3} and they connect it to God giving the Torah to

the People of Israel in *midrashim*, stories.⁴ Shavu'ot, unlike other major holidays, has no dedicated Talmudic tractate.⁵

In observance, a few Jews chant Torah under a <u>huppah</u>, marriage canopy. More decorate the synagogue in greenery, which counts as a variety of <u>huppah</u>. Some read a <u>ketubbah</u>, marriage contract, specifying the contract between God, the groom, and the People of Israel, the bride. Various references to Song of Songs predominate. Moreover, we see the number two, as in two tablets of the 10 Pronouncements, two <u>hallah</u> loaves, the <u>piyyut</u>/poem <u>Aqdamut</u> is a double acrostic, etc.

Shavu'ot emphasizes relationships. Jews promise that they accept only God, and God gives them a land and a more intimate, although not exclusive, status. Like a marriage, the couple is closer, but each person still has friends and family. Learning requires a partner and a teacher. In both, we see the importance of communication. Even with arranged marriages in the ultra-Orthodox world, the man and woman must talk to each other with understanding before they can wed.

Shavu'ot lacks real impactful symbols, which suggests that the relationship matters, nothing else. Inner intention counts, not external actions. We might remind ourselves of God with wearing tephillin and wrapping the straps around the arm seven times like the seven wedding blessings, and reciting a betrothal formula when we wrap the straps around the finger, like the wedding ring, but none of this occurs on Shavu'ot. Inner intention exclusively dominates the holiday. When inner feeling leaves, neither an outward symbol nor a contract will save the marriage. The same with our relationship with God. The Torah is housed in an ark, *aron*. The same word *aron*, also means coffin. When the spark of Torah leaves, the relationship dies, just as with a couple — when the inner feeling is destroyed by neglect, disrespect, or abuse, so too is the marriage.

I close with two stories. A Scotsman leaves home. His worried mother calls, to ask how he's doing. "Fine." "How about your neighbors?" "One moans all day, and the other bangs his head against the wall all day." "Stay away from them." "I do. I just stay home all day and play my bagpipes."

When Moshe, Moses, came down on Shavu'ot with the 10 Pronouncements, they were as light as a feather. When he saw the Israelites sinning with the Golden Calf, the letters flew off, the stone became really heavy, so he dropped it, and it broke.

A contract with no inner feeling cannot keep a relationship; without communication, understanding, and sensitivity, the relationship dies.

On Shavu'ot we stress our relationship with God. This relationship requires presence, understanding, sensitivity, love, and concern, all of them kept alive by communication. Our inner feelings are expressed by fulfilling God's demands on us, as God discerns what we need. Shavu'ot stresses our relationship with God and the work that it entails to keep it going, just like in a marriage. <u>Hag same-ah</u>, happy holiday.


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Leaves on the Tree of Life

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
Where to purchase kosher food locally

BJ's and **Costco** also have pareve cookies in their bakeries.


