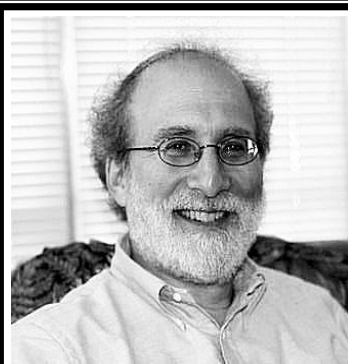
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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS: Purim Precedes Pesah

Purim, historically, does not precede Pesah*. Yet spiritually, it does. By looking at several points of overlap between Purim and Pesah, when Purim actually falls, and a halakhah of Purim, we will see a connection. (I've written about other connections in previous columns.)

The story overlaps with Pesah observance. In Esther 3:7, Haman talks about his plan with the king on the 1st day of the Hebrew month of Nisan, the month in which Pesah is observed, and in 3:12 the plan is published on the 13th day of Nisan. Accordingly, when Esther calls for her three-day fast, on Nisan 13, 14, and 15, it overlaps with Pesah. Tradition claims that Mordecai annulled Pesah due to Esther's request (Meg 15a, see especially Esther Rabbah 8:6 where Esther responds to Mordecai on fasting on Pesah: if there is no Israel, why should there be a Pesah!?) The commemorative fast is moved to the day before Purim, since subsequent generations cannot fast on Pesah.

Esther's two feasts would have occurred during Pesah. After the feast, Haman is hung on the gallows he prepared for Mordecai, so it too would have been during Pesah. (The fighting and the hanging of the Haman's sons take place in Adar, eleven months later, when the Jews fight back as their response to the decree allowing Haman's sons to attack them.)

When a new month is added to the Jewish calendar, it is added to the end of the year; hence Adar is doubled[^]. This creates a problem: in which month, the first or the second, to celebrate Purim? The Talmud rules the second (Mishnah and Gemara in Talmud Megillah 6b).

The last point is that on Purim, we do not recite Hallel, the Psalms of Praise (Psalms 113-118). The Talmud (Megillah 14a) gives three reasons. Reading the Megillah is its equivalent. Hallel only commemorates miracles which take place in the land of Israel⁺. Finally, the Purim miracle does not fundamentally change the Jewish condition. Hanukkah led to freedom, but Jews under Ahashverosh relied on him before and after the miracle; in other words, nothing changed other than surviving, and they still relied on the ruler's protection. But with Pesah, the Israelites were redeemed and were able to rule themselves and enter the Land of Israel. Purim is about the precarious condition of Jews in the diaspora, ultimately needing to rely on others; while within the Land of Israel, Jews assume responsibility for their own survival.

This means that Purim precedes Pesah because it is an incomplete redemption. Jews still live in exile and rely on others. Purim

teaches us about chances. We have another chance to keep going; it's status quo. Pesah is where we take destiny into our own hands and the world becomes a better place. Purim reminds us of the precariousness of life, that we must remember to move forward. Pesah tells of a better life in the future where everything is better. If we remember to work toward a better future, then God will see this and the messiah will come speedily and in our day.

Have a joyous Purim, and a happy and kosher Pesah.

* It occurs much later in the timeline of history, perhaps 5th century BCE if one tries to date it historically, or much later if one looks for sources. (Mordecai's Day appears in 2 Maccabees 15:36, probably completed before 142 BCE.)

[^] The new calendar year begins in Nisan according to Exodus 12:1-2 (see Mishnah Rosh Hashanah 1:1), even though the world was created in Tishri—I wrote about this in a previous column.

⁺ The Gemara has some objections to both of these, and the answers are not very convincing, including the fact that Pesah did not take place in the Land of Israel. The resolution is that before Joshua, Psalms of Praise could be said anywhere. Once Jews enter the Land of Israel under Joshua, they cannot. Since the Exodus was before, it is OK to recite Hallel on it, while Purim takes place afterwards, so it no longer is OK. Of course the Gemara does not deal with the Patriarchs having lived in the Land of Israel, and it's not like this is a halakhah in the Bible.

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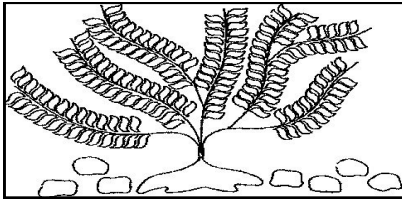
